

Annual General Meeting


Mercer Studio and Zoom – Tuesday, Dec. 9 – 4pm

Winter Assembly


Horton High School- Thursday, Dec. 18

Remembrance Day

The students In Grade 1 engaged in a series of activities as we acknowledged and learned about Remembrance Day and took time to reflect on the meaning of the holiday.

During language learning the students listened to a read aloud of the poem, 'In Flanders Fields' and explored what the concept of 'perspective' means and the ways in which poets, photographers and artists have different points of view and ways of seeing things. The students observed a painting of a poppy created by Georgia O'Keeffe and discussed the way in which she chose to paint the poppy using a close/zoomed in perspective/lens.

Each student then closed their eyes and we had two minutes of silent reflection time in which the students personally imagined what the poppies on Flanders Field would have look like. They each then illustrated a poppy in their own way using their creative voice and agency as to the materials and perspective they selected. The students loved how each picture of 'Flanders Fields' looked different and was unique based on their own decision to either 'zoom in or zoom out' when creating it.

The students also collaborated with Grade 2 & 3 to make a poppy out of torn paper after being inspired by a read aloud that reminded us all of the importance of the line 'lest we forget'.





Supporting our Local Libraries

Grade 4 students are wrapping up a Unit of Inquiry on children's rights and responsibilities. Through an exploration of Malala Yousafzai's global advocacy for children's rights to education and the importance of spreading the word to draw attention to important issues, students have begun exploring a local issue with connections to the unit theme: regional library funding challenges that could limit access to information and learning provided by libraries. Students have considered the questions "What does the library mean to me?" and "What does it mean to others in our communities?" They have conducted research by reading an article (featuring classmate Nico!), coming up with questions to interview a local librarian in Port Williams, and hearing from Jill Davies, a local community contact for CBC Nova Scotia Information Morning who has reported on the issue. Students who are interested in doing so will write letters to their local representatives in support of the issue.



Changes Are Coming to Your Library in 2026

The Annapolis Valley Regional Library is facing a critical budget shortfall in 2026. Inflation has increased 43% since 2009, but the Library's sustainable funding has only increased 10%.

The Province provided emergency funding this year which has helped us in the short term and for this, we are grateful. Unfortunately, this is not enough to prevent service changes.

What This Could Mean in 2026

Reduced service hours
Fewer new books and resources
Program and service reductions

Our Commitment

We are being transparent with our communities about these changes.

We remain hopeful that the Spring 2026 Provincial budget will provide the sustainable funding needed to maintain library service. With sustainable funding, libraries will remain essential community hubs.

Grade 5 Religions

In order to explore this concept in depth, the class invited in guest speakers enjoyed visits from John Rockwell, a Buddhist guest speaker, who shared how meditation helped him find calm and clarity when he felt lost, and Jodi and Steven Porter from Acadia Divinity College, who are theologians that study religions worldwide. The class took part in a meaningful field trip to Halifax where they had the opportunity to visit three different religious and cultural centres: Ummah Masjid & Community Centre, Vedanta Ashram Society Hindu Temple, and the Beth Israel Synagogue. These visits gave them a firsthand look at how different faiths express their beliefs through prayer, rituals, and community life.




Home Depot Partnership Enhances Design Tech. Program

In August, I reached out to the Home Depot in New Minas to explore a potential partnership in support of our school's new Design Technology program. Justin Einwiller, the store's Assistant Manager, generously committed to the initiative and provided a band saw for our wood shop.

Students in the Grade 7/8 Design Technology class began by completing a safety training course before embarking on their first woodworking project: designing and building a unique clock from a 10" x 10" piece of plywood. Each student created twelve initial concept sketches, from which two were selected and rendered in full colour. One final design was then chosen and developed into a full-scale cardboard mock-up, which later served as a cutting template for the wooden clock.

The completed projects showcased students' creativity, craftsmanship, and careful use of woodworking tools. Additional tools and materials will be donated by Mr. Einwiller in the coming months, and we would like to extend our sincere appreciation for his generous support of this exciting new program.

Fibre-Arts Fun!



Grades 2–3 explored needle felting for fun, carefully choosing colours to create realistic-looking “felted breakfasts” that quickly became favourite classroom toys. Grade 4 learned about the long history of weaving and practiced the classic “over and under” technique while crafting vibrant yarn-and-twigs sun catchers. Grade 5 designed needle-felted owl scenes using wool roving, discovering how sheep’s wool is prepared and dyed. Grade 6 created felted landscapes inspired by Nova Scotia’s natural beauty. And Grades 7–8 connected with the province’s rug-hooking heritage by crafting their own Nova Scotia scenes using hand-torn fabric strips, yarn, and wool roving.




